
THE COURT REPORTER: The attorneys participating in this deposition acknowledge that I am not physically present in the deposition room and that I

MS. CLARK: Thank you for the meeting with us again. Because today is a little more formal I just have to read through some statements and rules and then we'll get down to talking about some things we talked about before.

The New York Attorney General has appointed the law firms of Vladeck, Raskin & Clark and Cleary, Gottlieb, Steen & Hamilton to conduct an independent investigation under New York Executive Law Section 63(8) into allegations of sexual harassment brought against Governor Andrew Cuomo and as well as the surrounding circumstances.

You are here today pursuant to a subpoena in connection with that investigation. As you can tell from the outset this is being video recorded. Although we are officially recording this interview we still are maintaining a confidential investigation where we are not sharing information during the course of our investigation and it is still our intention for anyone like you who has come forward with an issue who does not want to be publicly identified to shield your name in any final report.

You are -- should be protected from retaliation for participating in this interview so if anything occurs that you

think is related in any way to you having spoken to us either the first time or now let Jessica know and she will alert us because we take that very seriously.

Today you are under oath, you just took an oath which means you must testify fully and truthfully just as if you were in a court of law sitting before a judge and jury. And your testimony is subject to a penalty of perjury.

I'll remind you at the end if you want to make a brief sworn statement of anything, either want to add or just stay on the record you're free to do so and I'll remind you at the end.

Also, I have to tell you that although this is a civil investigation, the New York Attorney General's office has criminal enforcement powers so you do have the right to refuse to answer a question if to do so would increment you. Any failure to answer can be used against you in a court of law in a civil proceeding, although not in a criminal proceeding. And if you have any questions about that either now or in the

course of the proceedings you can certainly speak to Jessica about it.

And you're here today with counsel.

If you have questions along the way about privilege issues you are free to take a break for you to consult with her about those.

In addition to the videographer we have a court reporter present with us virtually and she needs to be able to take down what each of us is saying to create a clear transcript and so there's a few grounds that are important to that. One is: It's important that you give a verbal response. If you gesture or shake your head or say uh-huh that doesn't come out so clearly.

If you don't understand a question, let me know and I'll try to rephrase it in a way that makes sense. If you don't know the answer to something, don't -- no one wants you to guess, just say you don't know. And the hardest part for both of us is that it's very hard for the court reporter if we speak at the same time. So

I will do my very best and it's harder by video to wait until you finish talking before I start my next question. And even if you think you know where my question is headed, unlike a normal conversation, let me get all the way there before you start answering. And if we start talking at the same time I'm sure the court reporter will speak up and let us know that we are making her life miserable.

Now in this proceeding you do not get a chance to review the transcript but if at any point when we're talking you remember that you need to clarify or change a prior answer or you remember something, you know, if we're talking about someone and you don't remember their name and then later you do feel free to speak up and say that you want to change your prior answer.

We shouldn't be going too, too long today but if at any point you need a break, just let me know, as long as there's not a question pending we can take a break any time you want. And then because of the nature of these proceedings being remote

could you and your counsel each confirm 1 2 that you are alone at the moment. 3 THE WITNESS: I'm alone. MS. CLARK: Jessica? 4 5 MS. WESTERMAN: I am also alone. 6 MS. CLARK: And I need you to also 7 confirm that you are not using any technology to create your own recording of 8 9 the proceeding including using any screen 10 capturing tools; is that accurate? 11 THE WITNESS: That's accurate. 12 MS. WESTERMAN: That's accurate. 13 MS. CLARK: And I need you to confirm 14 that you're not having anyone else listen 15 in through any -- including through any 16 phone or other devices; is that correct? 17 THE WITNESS: That's correct. 18 MS. And because this is a more formal testimony under executive law 63(8) that law prohibits you and your counsel from revealing anything about -- that we ask you about or anything that you tell us about.

So if anyone asks you later what did we discuss you should not tell them and you should let Jessica know and she will let us know that someone is trying to find out what was the topic of our discussion.

You are -- it doesn't mean that the underlying events you're free to talk about them or not talk about them just as you did before but in terms of the substance of our conversation.

That it, you know, it felt intentional and I remember like giving her this space to kind of say those things and truly pausing and thinking and wanting it to not be that he touched my butt in the way that he did but I knew from the moment that that occurred that that wasn't normal, that's not something that has ever happened to me in a professional setting. So I think that I repeated that, you know, that all I know is that I've never gotten my butt grabbed or touched at a professional or work event and that isn't right. And it wasn't like a moment of conflict it was just a moment of me asserting like the truth that I experienced.
- Q. And you said she didn't ask you how you were doing or how you were feeling. When it

happened, when the incident happened what were you feeling?

Α. When the incident happened? really shocked.
