Re: Letter regarding Executive Law 75(5)(b) Referral of Officer John Britzzalaro OAG Matter No. 1-793960287

Dear Commissioner Gramaglia,

We have reviewed your agency's referral of Police Officer John Britzzalaro pursuant to Executive Law Section 75(5)(b). Based on our review, we have not made a finding of a pattern or practice of misconduct, use of excessive force, or acts of dishonesty by Officer Britzzalaro.

However, we find that with respect to EC2020-048, on September 3, 2020, Officer Britzzalaro searched the complainant's vehicle without sufficient justification. In that incident, officers pulled over a vehicle after receiving a report that the vehicle's occupants had been involved in an attempted robbery involving verbal threats but no weapon. Before the occupants were identified by the victims and arrested, Officer Brizzalaro removed the occupants from the vehicle, patted them down, and placed them in police vehicles. He then searched the entirety of the vehicle. While the temporary detention of the occupants was justified pending their identification, there was no articulable reason to suspect that there was a weapon in the vehicle, and any immediate threat was eliminated once the occupants were removed, patted down, and detained in police vehicles. *People v. Torres*, 74 N.Y.2d 224, 544 N.Y.S.2d 796, 543 N.E.2d 61 (1989). While the search may have been justified as an inventory search after the arrest, there was no legal basis to search the entirety of the vehicle prior to the arrest.
