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E L I Z A B E T H G A R V E Y, having been first duly re-sworn by a Notary Public of the State of New York, upon being examined, testified as follows:

7 EXAMINATION BY

MS. CLARK:

Q. Good afternoon, Ms. Garvey. I'm sorry we had to bring you back. This should not be long.

I'm not going to go over all of them, but I went through a series of rules the first time, including not sharing what we discuss. All those rules still apply, as well as that neither you nor your counsel should be recording. All those rules are still in effect.

The first time around there was two conversations for which privilege was asserted that the Executive Chamber has told us they are not asserting privilege, so I'm just going to ask you about those two conversations.

The first one, you had testified

about having been on the phone with Mr. Ajemian and a reporter talking about Ms. Bennett's allegations and said that after the call that Mr. Ajemian was on, that there was a call that you were a part of that included Melissa DeRosa, Judy Mogul, Linda Lacewell, you thought Liz Smith, you thought Josh Vlasto, Peter Ajemian, and 10 Steve Cohen, you thought perhaps Rich 11 Azzopardi.

> Do you recall what was discussed in that conversation after the one that you had with Mr. Ajemian and the reporter?

> Α. Yeah, primarily what we discussed on the call was to relay the information to the group that Jesse McKinley had just outlined for us, and then, you know, we had a discussion about, you know, the incident that Charlotte -incidents that Charlotte was describing from notes that Judy Mogul had from her interview, and then discussed potential responses.

Q. And did Ms. Mogul read from her

3	A. She did.
4	Q. Did she read all of her notes in
5	that call?
6	A. As far as I know, yes.
7	Q. And what do you recall Ms. Mogul
8	said about the conversation she had months
9	earlier with Ms. Bennett?
10	A. You mean the entire contents of
11	her notes?
12	Q. What do you recall that she was
13	relaying in this group conversation?
1 4	A. She was relaying what Charlotte
15	had relayed to her and Jill Desrosiers in
16	two conversations, one at the end of June
17	and another, you know, following up at the
18	beginning of July July 1 or 2 I think
19	was what Judy thought it was with
2 0	respect to her interactions with the
21	Governor and her request for a transfer.
22	Q. And do you recall any of the
23	particular interactions that Ms. Mogul
2 4	shared with the group in that call?

She largely recounted a

similar set of facts so what was relayed by Jesse to us. You know, I don't think that sitting here right now I could go chapter and verse through all of them. But I remember, you know, the main facts were largely the same. I think there were some aspects that were, you know, not -- I think the way I recall was that Charlotte's characterization when Judy asked Charlotte to characterize how she felt about particular interactions or how she felt about particular conversations was different with respect to Judy's notes from how she had recounted how she had felt to Jesse McKinley.

- Q. Just to make sure I understand, are you saying that some of the particular incidents in terms of what Charlotte said the Governor said to her were the same or similar, but how she described how she felt about it had changed?
 - A. Correct.
- Q. And what do you recall were the differences in terms of how she felt about

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it between what Ms. Mogul said she said months earlier versus what the New York Times reporter was saying?

Well, I think, you know, with Α. respect to, you know, conversations about her dating life or, you know, what she thought about certain people in the office and, you know, whether or not she was dating, you know, I think one example Judy had recounted was that he had asked if she was interested in , who was someone working in the office. And Judy recounted from her notes that she asked if that made her uncomfortable and she said no; that she at one point -- I don't think this was relayed to us by Jesse, but Charlotte relayed to Judy that at one point the Governor challenged her to a push-up competition, and she showed that she could do a certain number of push-ups. Judy asked if that made her feel uncomfortable and she said no.

So without going through sort of each and every interaction, I think, as I

sit here now, what I recall is that there was certain aspects of how it had been relayed to Jesse, not necessarily the content dramatically changed but that, you know, as it had been relayed to Judy, it was Charlotte's characterization of the conduct as being not bothersome or not inappropriate.

Q. And did Ms. Mogul convey that there were things that Ms. Bennett said did make her uncomfortable when she was recounting them to Ms. Mogul?

A. I think that what Charlotte relayed -- again, this is a long time later, but I think what made her request a conversation was the request to find him a girlfriend; was that he had requested, you know, that Charlotte should assist him in finding someone to date and that I think she related to Judy. I don't think she directly expressed it as feeling uncomfortable, but that to her marked a transition in their interaction. At this

point she thought it would be best to seek

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a transfer.

Q. When Ms. Mogul was going through her notes and talking about her prior conversation with Ms. Bennett, did Ms. Mogul say she had found Ms. Bennett to be credible?

- A. You know, I don't recall that specifically as part of the conversation, but I don't think that Judy -- I don't remember Judy relaying that she found her not credible. But I don't specifically recall her outlining that.
- Q. And after Ms. Mogul shared what was in her notes, what do you recall people said on the call after that?
- A. Well, I think, you know, the question then was sort of back to whether or not -- you know, what the timing was, because the New York Times was planning to publish later that day. A response was necessary from our office, and so discussion about, you know, what the response -- who should make the response, you know, a spokesperson, the Governor,

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counsel, et cetera, and, you know, what

the content of that response should be.

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And what do you recall different

people were saying about what the content

of that response should be?

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I think what I recall -- I don't remember specifically, you know, this person said this or this person said that -- but I think there was an overwhelming desire to proceed very, very carefully and

be sensitive to the fact that, you know, Charlotte was relaying a story that I don't think factually there was much necessarily in dispute with respect to the specific facts that were in the story, and

it was not the intended meaning of any of

18	anyone talk about whether there might be
19	other women who would come forward?
20	A. No, I don't think so.
21	Q. Did anyone saying about knowing
22	about any other women that might come
23	forward?
24	A. I mean, what sticks out to me
25	was that this was a pretty all-consuming

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conversation about Charlotte, and so I don't have a specific recollection of

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anything else, no.

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Q. And in this conversation -- I

understand you knew the Times story was

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coming out and you were talking about some

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sort of a statement -- were you discussing

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about anything to do after a statement was

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issued with respect to these allegations?

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A. Yes. There was a conversation

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about, you know, what other sort of next

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steps, you know, might be required in

14	Q. And was that in person or on the
15	phone?
16	A. That was on the phone.
17	Q. How long did that conversation
18	last?
19	A. Maybe a half an hour or so.
20	Q. And what do you recall was said
21	by each of the participants in that
22	conversation?
23	A. The conversation was the
24	Governor asking one you know, he said I
25	asked Beth to be here to make sure that,

in light of all of the investigations, that we're not, you know, running afoul of any legal requirements. And then he asked Liz and Jeff about their perspectives on, you know, some recent events that he had held and, you know, polling and polling numbers that, you know, Jeff and Liz were seeing.

- Q. And when you say the Governor was asking about recent events, were those press conferences or press events or something else?

A. Press events, yes.

Q. And what feedback did Mr.

Pollack and Ms. Smith give the Governor about what they thought of and what the reaction was to those press events?

A. They felt that the, you know, vaccine events that he was doing -- at the time he was going and doing a number of those events -- that that was really getting good traction in the media and was, you know, positive and seemed to be

resonating with everyday New Yorkers.

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Q. Was there any discussion about any statements the Governor had made about any of the sexual harassment allegations?

A. I don't recall specifically.

Q. Do you recall whether there was anything that Mr. Pollack or Ms. Smith said was not getting a good reaction that the Governor was doing?

A. No, I don't.

Q. And you said the Governor said he wanted you on the call to make sure they didn't run afoul of any legal requirements.

What did you understand were the legal requirements that he was talking about?

A. Since he said it at the beginning of the conversation, truthfully I was not sure where the conversation was going to go, but the content of the conversation didn't really to me relate to anything that I would have had any salient advice on.

Q. In this conversation, was there

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any discussion about any statements or actions the Governor should take in the future that related to the sexual harassment allegations?

- I don't remember specifically relative to the sexual harassment allegations. I think it was a question of, you know, are these events, you know, losing the interest of the public and the press, and I think it was largely focused on vaccine delivery and reopening of the economy.
- And was there any discussion about whether the Governor was hoping that the focus on vaccines and issues like that would take attention away from the press attention to things like sexual harassment?
- I don't remember him saying that Α. in so many words, but I think that was implied in the conversation.
- Was there anything else 0. discussed in this conversation?
 - Α. Not that I remember, no.
